- Strategies:**
- Establish a whole-school moderation cycle (pre-assessment, mid-unit and post-assessment) across learning areas.
 - Use explicit success criteria, exemplars and common task design to improve alignment of curriculum, teaching, learning and assessment.
 - Embed student feedback loops so moderation outcomes inform timely feed up, feedback and feed forward.

- Strategies:**
- Formalise action team charters aligned to the college vision, purpose and values (bold, resilient, kind).
 - Use the FVSSC pedagogical approach (agency, agility, accessibility) to quality assure classroom practice and learning design.
 - Create routines for sharing effective practice across teams using evidence from student achievement, engagement and wellbeing data.

- Strategies:**
- Implement a school-wide peer observation and feedback protocol aligned to the pedagogical approach and college priorities.
 - Establish mentoring and coaching pathways for new, early career and experienced staff linked to professional growth goals.
 - Build a culture of high-quality professional learning focused on practice, reflection and impact on student learning.

- Strategies:**
- Define and communicate role descriptions, responsibilities and decision rights for middle leaders aligned to strategic priorities.
 - Establish leadership routines for tactical-to-strategic planning, monitoring and reporting of improvement actions.
 - Build leadership capability through coaching, mentoring and performance development linked to student outcomes and team wellbeing.

- Performance Measures**
- Improved consistency of A-C judgments across subjects and year levels, evidenced through moderation records and sample audits.
 - Increased proportion of students achieving A-C and improved growth in core subjects, alongside improved student understanding of success criteria.
 - Strengthened educational achievement and belonging/engagement indicators through clearer expectations and more responsive feedback.
 - Students can/will: describe what quality work looks like, use feedback to improve drafts/final submissions, and explain next steps in learning.
 - Teachers can/will: co-design or use agreed task-specific standards, participate in scheduled moderation, and adjust teaching based on moderation evidence.
 - ES Officers can/will support students to act on feedback, reinforce success criteria and organisational routines, and contribute observations of student progress.
 - Leadership team can/will: monitor moderation quality and completion, provide exemplars/protocols, and ensure alignment with the college pedagogical approach.
 - Moderation decisions are used to strengthen alignment and provide students with high-quality, actionable feedback that improves achievement and engagement.

- Performance Measures**
- Measurable improvement in student achievement, attendance/engagement and wellbeing indicators linked to action team priorities.
 - Increased staff confidence and consistency in using agreed pedagogical practices across classrooms.
 - Evidence of impact from action teams through implementation reviews, case studies and quality assurance snapshots.
 - Students can/will: experience more consistent contemporary learning experiences that are accessible, engaging and connected to authentic learning.
 - Teachers can/will: use and share effective pedagogies, trial improvements, and collaborate in action teams using evidence of impact.
 - ES Officers can/will support implementation of agreed routines and inclusive practices that enhance student engagement and wellbeing.
 - Leadership team can/will: set clear priorities for action teams, track impact, and build capacity and expertise through coaching, mentoring and quality assurance.
 - Shared practice strengthens educational achievement and belonging/engagement while supporting a safe, supportive and inclusive environment.

- Performance Measures**
- Increased participation in peer observation, mentoring and coaching cycles across all faculties.
 - Improved staff capability and confidence in agreed pedagogical practices and classroom routines.
 - Positive movement in staff wellbeing, professional learning and capability indicators, with evidence of impact on student outcomes.
 - Students can/will: experience more consistent teaching practices, clearer routines and improved access to high-quality learning in every classroom.
 - Teachers can/will: engage in observation/coaching cycles, seek and apply feedback, and reflect on impact using student evidence.
 - Teacher aides can/will support classroom routines and differentiated adjustments informed by shared practice and coaching goals.
 - Leadership team can/will:
 - Consider any additional positions based on local context. Instructional coaches / mentors (formal or distributed) support implementation and monitoring.
 - Success criteria: Peer observation, mentoring and coaching are embedded as normal professional practice across the college.
 - Professional learning is collaborative, evidence-based and visibly improves instructional practice and student learning experiences.

- Increased role clarity and consistency in middle leadership practice across learning areas and portfolios.
 - Improved implementation fidelity of school priorities, including moderation, pedagogy quality assurance and coaching systems.
 - Stronger staff confidence in leadership support and communication, aligned to portfolios, contributing to engagement and a positive work environment.
 - Students can/will: benefit from coordinated support, timely decisions and consistent expectations across subjects and year levels.
 - Teachers can/will: understand who to go to for curriculum, wellbeing and operational support, and receive clearer communication from leaders.
 - Teacher aides can/will work with clearly identified leaders to coordinate adjustments, supports and student follow-up.
 - Leadership team can/will: operate with clear responsibilities, use common planning/reporting processes, and lead improvement work aligned to college priorities.
 - Middle leadership capacity enables effective implementation of the strategic plan and responsive support for student learning and wellbeing.
